

A COMMUNITY YOUTH PROGRAM IN THE HEART OF BROOKLYN





THE NEED

Youth in Brooklyn continue to process trauma from the isolation of the Covid-19 pandemic, the daily barrage of news about global conflict and the pressures of social media.

City budget cuts leave schools and communities with little access to arts programs, particularly in under-resourced neighborhoods.


THE OBJECTIVE

To empower youth in our community with innovative, no-cost programming that uses music, poetry and song to facilitate creative expression and community building.



THE CHALLENGE

The local Title 1 schools that our students attend - MS 890, MS 246 (The Walt Whitman School), Ditmas JHS 62, MS 442, and PS 139 - have little to no arts funding.





only have access to music education through our program.

At private middle schools, like Columbia Grammar & Preparatory School, students participate in band, choral and orchestra programs three to five days a week within the school curriculum. Many of these students also take private music lessons and participate in a variety of arts and cultural activities outside of school.

Public schools in our Flatbush neighborhood, like Ditmas Junior High School, that mostly serve low-income students are less likely to have music offered as a significant part of the curriculum. Most families have few resources to rent instruments and pay for lessons and are unable to make up for the gap in creative enrichment activities.



THE IMPORTANCE OF MUSIC EDUCATION 50

Middle school students who learn music score significantly higher on algebra assignments in ninth grade than their non-music educated counterparts.

High school students who participate in music ensembles report the lowest lifetime and current use of harmful substances (tobacco, alcohol, and illicit drugs).

Schools with music programs have an estimated 90.2 percent graduation rate and 93.9 percent attendance rate compared to schools without music education, which average 72.9 percent graduation and 84.9 percent attendance.*

THE OPPORTUNITY

Our neighborhoods are among the most racially, ethnically and economically diverse in America, presenting a unique opportunity for connections across social barriers.

Our students, families and teachers bring a rich cultural diversity of musical influences.

There is demand for live music! All of our concerts are well attended by a mix of families and community members.

Although students don't have access to music in the public schools, the neighborhood is home to a remarkable wealth of resources - professional musicians, educational institutions like Brooklyn College, performance venues like Kings Theater.

Mobilizing these resources can fill the gap left by the city and schools, thereby building community and enriching the lives of underserved children.



WHAT WE DO

Brooklyn Porch Music provides no-cost, accessible, and high-quality music programming to participants who live alongside and look like the audience they are performing for, demonstrating the ability of all to access creative outlets and uplift their communities, without regard to age, race, or class.

With a focus on creativity, storytelling, collective improvisation, and music composition, the program encourages students to think independently and try new forms of expression.

Youth write songs and stories about their neighborhood, and perform them alongside their mentors and peers in underutilized public spaces.

Our curriculum provides a foundation in improvisation, music literacy, and aural training, preparing students with the skills necessary to be professional, creative musicians.

While the program focuses on jazz and pop music, it also incorporates material that is culturally relevant to the participating youth and mentors. We learn and perform music from Pakistani films, Argentinian folk songs, Arabic melodies, and Afro-Caribbean drum patterns.

Through intensive one-on-one mentorship with local musicians, original composition workshops, large group ensemble rehearsals and performances in interactive multigenerational community concerts, youth participants develop their skills as creative artists and explore the role of music in community building.

The program provides dignified, meaningful work for young professional musicians from working class neighborhoods in Brooklyn and pays them a living wage.

melodies and write poetry on the themes that matter to them most

Youth gather with professional mentors and peers for a big band rehearsals in which they learn to play their original compositions




OUR STORY

Our program was inspired by Roy Nathanson's daily porch concerts beginning in March 2020 at the start of the pandemic. Every day at 5 pm, Roy and a group of local professional musicians played one song for a socially distanced audience. With community support, these concerts evolved into a dynamic, COV1D-safe outdoor music program, which today has become Brooklyn Porch Music.



"Mr. Nathanson and his band played each evening from April 2 until Father's Day, 82 days total. In that time, they started a website, raised donations for local food pantries and penniless musicians, and lit up a neighborhood."

For example, one student wrote a meditation on sitting alone during the pandemic amid heaps of laundry. Others wrote about the avenues – Coney Island, Flatbush and Utica – that connect their communities."

"The fact that I'm 16 and playing with kids that go to middle school and even younger is incredible to me, because we can all bond over music," said Haiz Diallo. "To be doing something so communal is very important in these times."



OUR IMPACT

Since 2020, we have served over 200 young people with eight seasons (two per year) of music programming.

In our 2022 program survey, an astounding 98% of students reported that our program positively influenced how they view themselves, and 95% reported that the program helped them form meaningful friendships with peers and adult mentors.

Program Participation in Spring 2023:

- 88% average program attendance (present/expected)
- 97% of youth say they plan to return to the Program
- 87% felt good or great about Sunday Lessons
- 81% felt good or great about Ensemble rehearsal
- 100% of youth felt good or great about their relationship with mentors

OUR COMMUNITY


At Brooklyn Porch Music, we strive to cultivate respect and understanding for neighbors across class and racial divides, strengthening the bonds of our community.


Our program is no-cost but based on the mutual aid model, meaning everyone contributes what they can.

While the priority is for working class families, the middle class families involved support the program through making donations, transporting equipment, and bringing snacks for rehearsals.

All families have the responsibility to support their children in their musical journeys by reinforcing teaching and encouraging practicing habits.

All families contribute food for seasonal potlucks, hand out flyers in their neighborhoods and help set up for concerts.

Support a robust concert schedule of twenty outdoor community performances a year.


Provide year round programming through the summer and winter seasons.


